

The list order is conformed the WP checklist with the recent changes on the splitting and lumping issue mainly based on publications in the "important magazines". Subspecies is only mentioned when thought to be important and really visible in the field. The totals of birds per species are just a total of the birds I saw to give an idea how many of a species you encounter during a trip. Only species seen are mentioned, and heard when, no lifer.

On this trip the weather was cold and rainy/snowy in the mountains between 5 and 10 degrees Celsius but with periods of sunshine and warmer (20 degrees) in the Steppes.

The route we travelled in the week we birded there.

Itinerary

06-04 Flew during the evening and night from Dusseldorf to Tbilisi to arrive in the early morning, and met my guide **Alexander Rukhaia**, <u>Alexander Rukhaia</u> (<u>@alexanderrukhaia</u>) • <u>Instagramfoto's en -video's</u> later on drove to the close by Kumisi Lake to bird and later on drove with birding stops to Stephantsminda in the Kazbegi area.

07-04 Birded all day in the Kazbegi area with the focus on the snowcocks.

08-04 Birded all day in the Kazbegi area

09-04 Birded all day in the Kazbegi area

10-04 Birded all day in the Kazbegi area because we were stuck because the pass was closed.

11-04 In the morning birded in the Kazbegi area and later on, because of the reopening of the pass, drove down with birding stops to the steppe area and spend the night in Dedoplistskaro.

12-04 Birded in the Steppe area and slept in Dedoplistskaro.

13-04 Drove from Dedoplistskaro via the David Gareji Monastery to Kumisi Lake and birded there. In the afternoon we got totally stuck with the car so I had to take another driver to bring me back to Tbilisi.

14-04 Flew back in the early morning to Dusseldorf .





72. <u>Armenian Gull – Larus armenicus</u>

06+13-04 20+ birds at Kumisi lake, many immatures and a few nice

adults. It was for me a long time since I saw that taxon.

73. Caspian Tern – Hydroprogne caspia

06-04 2 birds at Kumisi lake, calling a lot.

74. White-winged Black Tern – Chlidonias leucopterus

13-04 2 birds at Kumisi lake in nice summer plumage.

75. Rock Dove – Columba livia

Quite common in the mountains, only wild looking birds counted.

76. Stock Dove – Columba oenas

12-04 1 bird seen along the way.

77. Wood Pigeon - Columba palumbus

12-04 5 birds seen along the way

78. Collared Dove - Streptophelia decaocto

About 3 birds seen in the steppe villages.

79. Eagle Owl - Bubo bubo

06-04 1 bird seen very nice at a breeding site neat Tbilisi.

80. Little Owl – Athene noctua ssp: indigena

About 5 birds seen spread over the trip

81. Eurasian Scops Owl – Otus scops

12-04 1 bird a rufous face seen extremely well in a bush near Dedoplistskaro. A great experience to see one staring at me with its yellow eyes.

Quite commonly seen in small groups during the trip in the mountains and steppes.

84. Hoopoe – Upupa epops

Quite commonly seen during the trip in the mountains and steppes mainly migrants.

85. Great Spotted Woodpecker - Dendrocopos major

11-04 1 ex. during a lunch stop along the way.

86. Skylark – Alauda arvensis

Quite common in the steppes.

87. Crested Lark - Galerida cristata

Quite common in the steppes.

88. Woodlark - Lullula arborea

11-04 3 ex. heard singing while birding in the evening near Dedoplistskaro.

89. Greater Short-toed lark – Calandrella brachydactyla ssp: artemisiana

13-04 25 ex. in small flocks in the steppe area visited.

92. Sand Martin - Riparia riparia

13-04 10 ex. seen at Kumisi Lake.

93. Crag Martin - Ptyonoprogne rupestris

10-04 2 ex. seen about one of the visited cliffs near Dedoplistskaro.

94. Barn Swallow - Hirundo rustica

Common throughout the trip also migrants in the mountains.

95. House Martin - Delichon urbicum

13-04 10 ex. seen at Kumisi Lake.

96. Tawny Pipit – Anthus campestris

2-04 3 ex. seen very well in the steppes, migrating birds.



97. Water Pipit – Anthus spinoletta ssp: coutellii

Very common throughout the trip, in the beginning also in the lowlands (Kumisi Lake)

98. Meadow Pipit – Anthus pratensis

11-04 7 ex. seen in one little flock entering the steppes.

99. Tree Pipit – Anthus trivalis

A total of 3 birds heard and seen in the steppe area.

100. White Wagtail - Motacilla alba ssp:

Common throughout the trip, mainly in the lowlands.

101. Western Yellow Wagtai – Motacilla flava ssp: feldegg, thunbergi + form: dombrowskii

Feldegg was the most common throughout the trip.

104. Dipper – Cinclus cinclus ssp: caucasicus

A total of 5 birds seen in mountain streams in the Kazbegi area.

105.(Caucasian) Dunnock - Prunella (modularis) ssp: obscura

Very common in the mountains of the Kazbegi area. Very spotted underparts and quite a different song than the birds I know.

106. Nightingale – Luscinia megarhynchos ssp: africana

12-04 1 ex. seen while searching for the pheasant, paler than our birds.

107. Robin - Erithacus rubecula

A total of 2 birds seen in the Kazbegi area.

108.Bluethroat – Luscinia svecica ssp: magna

08-04 1 ex. a female type and migrant in the dam bushes neat Stephantsminda

109. Common Redstart - Phoenicurus phoenicurus ssp: phoenicurus

A total of 10 ex. seen all migrans spread over the trip (mainly in the mountains). Surprisingly no real wing panels noticed so classified as the nominate subspecies.

110.Black Redstart – Phoenicurus ochruros ssp: ochruros

Common in the mountains, nice to see the all red underpart. Song quite different from ours.

111. <u>Guldenstadt's Redstart – Phoenicurus erythrogastrus</u>

Common in the mountains and seen daily with 40+ individuals. Nice adult male, females and some first year males. One of the targets of this trip to see in big numbers.



112.Northern Wheatear - Oenanthe oenanthe

Common throughout the trip, mainly in the mountains, already paired birds.

113. Isabelline Wheatear - Oenanthe isabellina

Common throughout the steppe part of the trip.

114. Eastern Black-eared Wheatear - Oenanthe melanoleuca

A total of 30 birds seen on the steppe days of the trip. Great views and often in pairs.

115. Finsch Wheatear - Oenanthe finschii

13-04 1 ex. most likely a hybrid bird because the brownish borders of the white mantle and also the bird did not look particular small.

116. Pied Wheatear - Oenanthe pleschanka

A total of 15 birds seen in the steppe area. One bird showed white feathers on the lower back. This bird was near David Gareji Monastery and suspected of hybrid influences.

117. Whinchat - Saxicola rubetra

07-04 2 ex. in the Kazbegi area

118. Siberian Stonechat – Saxicola maurus ssp: variegatus

Quite common during the whole trip, also in the mountains (but less than in the lowlands). Great to see these "white tail based" birds. The white at the tail base was not often seen well when perched.

119. European Stonechat - Saxicola rubicola ssp: rubicola


A total of 5 (most likely one family) at the river dam at Stephantsminda. Looking like the normal stonechats I see most of my days at home.

120.Song Thrush – Turdus philomelos

Common during the whole trip.

121. Mistle Thrush – Turdud viscivorus

122. Fieldfare – Turdus pilaris

A total of 7 birds seen well in the Kazbegi area.

123.Blackbird - Turdud merula

Common throughout the trip.

124. Ring Ouzel - Turdus torquatus ssp: amicorum

Commonly seen in the Kazbegi area, also singing.



125.Blue-rockThrush - Monticola solitarius

12-04 1 male in a visited gorge.

126.Blackcap – Sylvia atricapilla

11-04 20 ex. in one flock at a lunch stop in a fruiting forest tree.

127.Lesser Whitethroat – Sylvia curruca ssp: curruca or blythi

Common in the steppe area's also migrating (blythi??) birds.

128. Eastern Orphean Warbler – Sylvia crassirostris

A total of 10 birds seen in the steppe area, some nice views of singing birds, big and a pale eye. Often in song but secretive.

129. Menetries Warbler – Sylvia mystacea ssp: mystacea

A total of 4 birds seen in the steppe area of which the last bird seen very well singing along a dried out river in bare bushes. Nice orange eye-ring. The birds looked very pale on the underparts without pink (as supposed to be with this subspecies)??

130. Willow warbler - Phylloscopus trochilus

07-04 1 bird seen a migrant in the bushes of Stephantsminda.

131. Chiffchaff – Phylloscopus collybita ssp: caucasicus?

About 30 birds seen all migrants in the Kazbegi area. These birds called as Siberian Chiffchaff and did not respond on the song of the nominate??

132.Goldcrest - Regulus regulus

10-04 1 ex. seen near Stephantsminda.

133. Firecrest - Regulus ignicapilla

11-04 1 ex. at a lunchstop in a fruiting forest tree.

134. Eurasian Wren - Troglodytes troglodytes ssp: hyrcanus

Common, mainly in the mountains.

135. Red-breasted Flycatcher - Ficedula parva

11-04 1 ad. male at a lunch stop in a fruiting forest tree. Singing and, after a while, showing well with the tail pattern and red throat and upper breast.

136. Semicollared Flycatcher – Ficedula semitorquata

10-04 1 female at the bushes near Stephantsminda. A female "out of the book" with the white tips on the lesser wing coverts.



A Semi-collared female was a nice surprise in the mountains.

137. Great Tit – Parus major

Common throughout the trip.

138. Coal Tit – Periparus ater ssp: michalowskii

About 10 birds seen spread over the mountain days. Quite pale belly.

139.Blue Tit – Cyanistes caeruleus

Common throughout the trip.

140.Long-tailed Tit – Aegithalos caudatus ssp: major

10-04 4 ex, seen in one flock at a lake area beneath Stephantsminda. Quite different than our birds with nice grey-blue upperpart.

141. Eurasian Nuthatch - Sitta europaea ssp: caucasica

11-04 1 ad.at a lunch stop, looking very much like the birds I see in my area with warm colored underparts.

142. Kruper's Nuthatch – Sitta krueperi

06-04 2 ex. at a place near Tbilisi. Great views of birds inspecting nesting holes.



143. Western Rock Nuthatch - Sitta neumayer

12-04 1 ex. seen quite well at a visited gorge, also heard calling.

144. Wallcreeper - Tichordoma muuraria

A pair seen very well on most of the days at a bridge near Stephantsminda.



145. Treecreeper – Certhia familiaris ssp: persica

10-04 2 ex. in a small forest patch in the village of Stephantsminda. Not very different from the other subspecies I saw in my life.

146. Magpie – Pica pica

Common throughout the trip.

147. Eurasian Jay – Garrulus glandarius ssp: krynicki

Quite common during the trip, quite white- faced birds.

148. Jackdaw – Corvus monedula ssp: soemmerringii

12-04 2 ex. seen while birding along the way. Very striking birds, see the (not sharp unfortunately) photo.



149.Red-billed Chough - Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax

Quite common in big flocks in the mountains.

150. Alpine Chough - Pyrrhocorax graculus

Less common than Red-billed but two big flocks seen in the mountains.

151. Rook - Corvus frugilegus

Common in the steppe areas.

152. Hooded Crow - Corvus cornix

Common throughout the trip mainly in the lowlands.

153. Raven - Corvus corax

Common in the mountains.

154. Common Starling - Sturnus vulgaris

Common throughout the trip mainly in the steps.

155. House Sparrow - Passer domesticus

Locally common during the trip.

156. Spanish Sparrow - Passer hispaniolensis

11-04

60 ex. in one flock near Stephantsminda. Migrants.



157. Tree Sparrow – Passer montanus

About 20 birds seen in the steppe area.

158. Rock Sparrow – Petronia petronia

12-04 1 male inspecting nests and giving great views, see the little

159. Chaffinch – Fringilla coelebs ssp: solomkoi

Common in the visited forests, not different than our birds, song also the same.

160.Linnet - Carduelis cannabina

Common in the lowlands.

161. Twite - Carduelis flavirostris ssp: brevirostris

About 15 birds seen in the Kazbegi area, nice to see this totally different looking from our birds (again). Quite a surprise nobody "dived" into this group for splitting.

162.Goldfinch - Carduelis carduelis

Common mainly in the lowlands.

163. Greenfinch - Chloris chloris

12-04 2 ex. seen in a village.

164. Siskin – Carduelis spinus

10-04 2 ex. while birding in the mountains.

165. Red-Fronted Serin – Serinus pusillus

Common in flocks and also singing in the Kazbegi area. Great birds to see again.

166. Bullfinch – Pyrrhula pyrrhula ssp: rossikowi

About 10 birds seen spread over the days in the Kazbegi area. I do not know if this subspecies is the same or related to the "Komi Bullfinches" which in some winters occur in our country? There call was not much different.



167. Hawfinch - Coccothraustes coccothraustes

11-04 3 ex. in flight near Stephantsminda. Good views and calling.

168. <u>Great Rosefinch – Carpodacus rubicilla ssp: rubicilla</u>

About 130 birds seen on most days (the most when bad weather) around Stephantsminda. Very nice views of big flocks also calling. Much darker than the Tibetan birds I have seen. A target for this trip.





169. Reed Bunting - Emberiza schoeniclus ssp: caspia

13-04 2 ex. along the shore of Kumisi Lake.

170. Yellowhamer – Emberiza citrinella

10-04 2 ex. seen well in the bushes near Stephantsminda

171. Corn Bunting – Emberiza calandra

Very common in the steppe area, singing everywhere.

172. Rock Bunting - Emberiza cia

About 20 birds seen in small flocks spread over the days in the mountains. Nice views often feeding and not singing.

I did not kept a mammal list this trip but Jungle cat Moeraskat - Felis chaus - Observation.org was the best mammal.
