
Autumn birding in Iran

Introduction

A while ago, a birder friend told me of his plan to go birdwatching in Iran for two weeks during November. This was accompanied by an invite to come along, so needless to say, I boarded that train!

Our trip would be in the second half of the month, between 12 and 26 of November. For the both of us Iran seemed like an interesting country which is a bit of the beaten path, both touristically and birdwise. So when we talked to friends who had visited Iran, we became more enthusiastic, since everyone praised the friendliness of the people and the beauty of the landscape.

Birdwise Iran fits typically into the Middle East region. For a European, bird species are quite familiar but with a nice addition of more eastern specialties. For me personally, this would be a trip with not to many new species, since I have visited the Emirates and had my fair share of desert birding in Morocco. But still some nice species are lurking around.

Especially the south coast gives an Arabian feeling, both the climate and the birds, but still there are some differences with what you find on the other side of the Strait of Hormuz. Some birds are at their westmost distribution on the south east coast of Iran. Iran also has a (near) endemic bird, the Pleske's Ground Jay, which can be found in the central and eastern steppes and deserts.

Coming to the Caspian coast, habitats change dramatically, the Alborz mountains shield off the inner parts from rain and therefore the Caspian coast is a very green area, largely cultivated, with wooded hills on the north flanks of the Alborz. This coastline is an important wintering ground for waterfowl and many others. And last but not least, this is the wintering ground of a single male Siberian Crane from the western populations. This bird winters in the rice fields of Fereydunkenar.

Geographically, Iran is diverse and ranges from coastal plains and mangroves to snow-peaked mountains. But dominating is a rugged and arid landscape.

Climate throughout the country differed gravely, the south brought sub-tropical heath, while the central parts had cold nights and pleasant daytime temperatures. The north was rather similar to the centre, but less cold nights.

Logistics

We flew with Pegasus airline (230 euro) to the Imam Khomeini International Airport in Tehran, with a transfer in Istanbul. In Iran we moved around using public transport. For long distances, this was mainly busses (VIP) and short distances taxi/savari. Hitchhiking in a western sense was rather hard, since everybody is kind of a taxi. We also took a comfortable night train from Tehran to Bandar Abbas.

Bus network is extensive, but not all cities have a terminal, but you can flag a bus down in the streets.

Train tickets were booked beforehand using www.iranrail.net for 27 euro per person.

Bus tickets were mostly bought at the moment itself, but once or twice this resulted in some waiting time because busses were already full. Busses are inexpensive, e.g. a bus ride of 450km costs about 8 euro pp. Tables in the link give a good indication of prices for busses from Tehran: https://www.lonelyplanet.com/iran/tehran/transport/getting-there-away/land.

We mostly slept in a tent during the trip, interchanged with hotel/motel/guesthouse, all cheap.

The currency in Iran is Iranian Rials. Our exchange rate was €1=47600 IRR. Because of the impracticality of these high numbers, most prices are said in Toman, 1 Toman=10 IRR. So beware if you think something is ridiculously cheap, it is likely the tenfold. ATM's don't accept Visa/Mastercard/Maestro, so exchange cash. We changed each 200 euro, which was sufficient for the entire trip.

We read that using a thumbs up is considered rude, but actually saw some people using it in a western fashion, even on neon signs. Also wearing shorts is not commonly done, so be aware of that. But follow what the locals do. My impression was that they did not really care when I rolled my trousers in the south.

Itinerary

- 12/11: Landed at IKA around 4 am, took the train to Bandar Abbas around noon
- 13/11: Wader watching eastern Bandar Abbas, ride to Tiab, camping near shrimpfarms
- 14/11: Tiab coastal area, ride to Minab, Melat Park
- 15/11: Start in Melat, dategroves, wadi near Minab
- 16/11: Wadi, ride to Bandar Abbas, ferry to Qeshm, ride to Laft and Tabl
- 17/11: Tabl (Hara forest), ride to ferry and bus to Shahr e Babak
- 18/11: Steppe birding west of Shahr e Babak
- 19/11: Steppe birding and bus to Yazd, visiting Yazd

Detailed report

I will not give a day by day report, but discuss the different locations visited, per region

Southern coastal region (13-17/11)

Bandar Abbas (13/11)

6:30 am, arriving with the train for Tehran. We are welcomed by a warm climate and some taxi's. After some chatting with the drivers we arrived on the coast at the east side of town. Here the flats begin, which means wader time! Walking along the coast towards the flats, birds came in nicely: Purple Sunbirds in the park with Green Bee-eaters and some Pallid Swifts. The tidal area started to grow and Dunlins, Little Stints, Sanderlings, Ringed-, Kentish-, Grey- and Great Sand Plover came into sight. Terek Sandpiper was rather common and some Marsh Sandpipers were around. We stopped under a tree at a little outflow where a group of waders were feeding. Here Lesser Sandplover and both Godwits were added. But waders were not the only thing around. On the fence a White-throated Kingfisher and a male Variable Wheatear kept us company. Flying around on the flats were Gull-Billed Terns and Caspian Terns. On a wooden structure for fishing, Lesser and Greater Crested Tern were resting with Cormorants.

Suddenly I noticed a group of waders flying with 2 larger individuals, which I couldn't place, luckily they landed, For the first seconds I could not really grip what I was seeing, that's no redshank! Soon realisation came that I indeed was looking at 2 **Great Knots**, euphoria

dominated the moment as I didn't expect to see this target this easily! Some scanning set the tally on 8 individuals.

We walked to the bus station and took a savari for 4 euro pp to Minab, and then to Tiab.



Tiab (13-14/11)

Arriving in Tiab brought us an **Indian Pond Heron**. We walked to the eastside of the village to a tidal gully with some docked boats. A **White-Throated Kingfisher** was around and a young **White-Winged Tern** flew by. Thinking about a strategy to bird this area I looked around a bit with my binoculars, a huge bill and stripped head caught my attention, **Great Stone-Curlew** (map 2, point 3)! Now that was easy...

Walked along the main road to the shrimpfarms and pitched our tent. A walk in the area produced Isabelline Wheatear, Lesser Short-Toad Lark and Afghan Babbler. Next day we went along the northside of the shrimpfarms and left the track after crossing a ditch (map 2, blue line). Dunlins, Little Stints, Curlew Sandpipers and Citrine Wagtails welcomed us. Hopping in the sand we found some Sand Larks. As we went further, a committee of about 500 Cormorants and some Dalmatian Pelicans showed us the way to the mangroves. We dropped our bags (map 2, point 5) and left them in the good care of a Clamorous Reed Warbler, Greater Spotted Eagle and some waders. At the big tidal stream we parked ourselves for some birding (map 2, point 6). A group of 11 Great Stone-Curlews landed before our eyes to fly-off minutes later. Greater Spotted Eagles were rather numerous, chilling in the mangroves. Mudskippers revealed themselves with the falling tide and in between an aggregation of Curlews 2 Pied

Avocets joined the wader list. After some walking and swimming we set of towards town where a **Shikra** flew by.

Minab (14-16/11)


When we arrived in Minab, we checked into the Minab tourist hotel next to Melat Park (*map 3, point 7*). We decided to check the park before darkness. An **Indian grey mongoose**, **Purple Sunbirds**, **White-Throated Kingfisher** and **Desert Whitethroats** were around. Suddenly both of us stood still and shouted: DRONGO! A Drongo was flying around and perched in a tree. I took some picks, went closer and the lack of a rictal spot, contrast between belly and back and bill shape convinced us this was an **Ashy Drongo**. We followed it for a while and while photographing I suddenly saw a black shape bobbing its head. Yes, **Spotted Owlet!**

The 15th was dedicated to the date groves and more precisely, Sind Woodpecker. First stop to look for the Drongo got us a male **Crested Honey Buzzard.** We walked towards the palms but were stopped by 2 guys who lead us into a compound, something about police. They were on the edge of aggressive, asking for passports, so we said they were in the hotel. After some calling, the mood changed to a more hospital one and we could make out that we should not continue there, thieves. So we made a detour and walked towards the groves. A **Shikra** flew by and 2 **Crested Honey Buzzards**. Some **Silverbills** and **Kingfishers** kept us amused, but no sign of our quarry. The sun was burning and after leaving our first site for Sind Woodpecker we walked further along the path. Suddenly a woodpecker call and yes, there he was, a male **Sind Woodpecker**, perched in a palm tree with a **White-throated Kingfisher** (*map 3, point 8*). Satisfied, we returned to the hotel and chilled a bit.


Later we walked to the Wadi near Minab. We stopped at a spot where water was still flowing and reeds grew (*map 3, point 9*). 3 **Graceful Prinia's** were calling and later I flushed a francolin, could have been Black Francolin, but I could not exclude Grey with certainty.

Next day we did some early morning birding next to the rocky slopes, **Striolated Bunting** and **Desert Lark** were common and we also found a male **Hume's Wheatear**. We had been scanning the slopes and suddenly Willem prevailed, 4 **See-See Partridges** were running on the slopes. At the stream I saw a **Moustached Warbler** and 6 **Wild Boars** came out of the bushes.

Qeshm (16-17/11)

On arriving with the ferry we had some Lesser Crested Terns and Indian Humpbacked dolphins.

Qeshm island proved to be less productive than expected. We visited the Hara forest, which is a big mangrove area. First we went to Laft, but not many birds around except the expected herons, so we headed for Tabl. We were lead to the village of Salakh were we slept in a guesthouse. Next morning when we left the village a zipping call draw our attention, some **Plain Leaf Warblers** were hopping in the Acacia's. 3 **Egyptian Vultures** flew around and then we got a ride to Tabl. We walked until the end of the jetty where we stayed shortly. On the way we saw a young **Shikra**, **Gull-Billed Terns**, **Variable Wheatear** and our target, a group of **Crab Plovers**.

We had it with the heat, and birdwise our targets where seen, so we went back to the ferry and took a bus to Shahr e Babak.

Central region: Shahr e Babak (18-19/11)



Map 5: Overview Shahr e babak.


We started walking the 18th early morning and got a ride to our destination, the steppes near Shahr e Babak. This should be a good site for Pleske's Ground Jay so we planned to spent the day here. We dropped our bags a bit away from the road and started walking (map 6, point 14). Soon we saw our first **Desert Wheatear** of the trip. I said to Willem, we might see its stalker, and yes a small bird was following the wheatear, Desert Warbler it was. The steppes here were dominated by low Artemisia shrubs with some widespread Zygophyllum in between. But further away the latter became more abundant. While walking we enjoyed Bar-Tailed Larks, Scrub Warblers, Skylark, Crested Lark, 2 Crowned Sandgrouses and Lesser Short-Toad Lark. Zygophyllum shrubs became more abundant and while scanning I saw an orange shape in a shrub. This could be it, I took my scope and yes, Pleske's it was! We followed the bird and discovered that there were 2 of them (Map 6, point 12). They were quit shy and we always found them perched in a bush, upon approaching they would jump to the ground and run/fly away, to be gone for some time. Mission accomplished! We returned and had a distant Black-Bellied Sandgrouse. We chilled around our backpacks and saw Imperial Eagle, Finch Wheatear, Little Owl, Steppe Grey Shrike and Long-legged Buzzard. Late afternoon we did another walk and stumbled upon the Pleske's again. Still shy, but better light. We pitched the tent in a depression en enjoyed the beautiful starscape (map 6, point 13).


Next morning I went for a walk and managed to see 2 **Pleske's** again. We packed our stuff and headed back to the road. **Crowned Sandgrouses** were moving and we enjoyed nice flybys of groups up to 30 individuals. A **Steppe grey Shrike** landed at 3 meters of us and suddenly Willem saw a big bird flying, we took our bins and I shouted Houbara, meaning **Macqueens Bustard.**

After the reintroduced birds in the Emirates, this was finally a tick for me, and an observation like I wanted it, shy birds flying over the steppes! We headed for Yazd were we stayed in the Yazd Friendly Hostel.




Map 6: detail of Shahr e Babak. Pleske's spot (12), Sleeping place (13), backpack drop point (14).






Northern coastal Area (21-25/11)

Fereydunkenar (21/11)

Arrived middle of the night in Babolsar, so we walked westwards towards a pond. On our way we heard Robins, Song Thrushes and Redwings. A Long-Eared Owl flew by. The pond was a hunting paradise with nets everywhere and reeds were cut, so we didn't stay there. Meadow Pipits were common. Suddenly we heard a strange calling pipit. After checking with recordings, this was most likely a **Buff-bellied Pipit** (map 8, point 15)! We took a bus towards Fereydunkenar and dropped our stuff at a camping near the coast (map 8, point 16). A quick scan over sea resulted in Sandwich Tern, Little Gull, Crested Grebe, Black-necked Grebe and Caspian Gull. Off to the fields, the centre of town had a statue of 2 Siberian Cranes, so we were in the right place. Leaving the town we saw a big swirm of Cormorants and ducks, Tree Sparrows, Chaffinches, Bramblings, Spanish Sparrows were common. On the fields a lot of Skylarks with some Calandra Larks in between were seen. A local brought us to another part of the area where fields were more wet. Water Rails ran over the road and we stumbled upon a site which was pretty sealed off (map 8, point 17), likely the other side was were all the waterfowl was. Locals invited us to tea and something to eat. Everybody knows which bird you want to see and they started to call. Unfortunately, the last wintering Siberian Crane hadn't arrived yet. So we walked around a bit in between the fields, ponds and hunting areas. Raptors were diverse here: Greater Spotted-, Steppe- and Imperial Eagles, Long-legged Buzzard, **Common Buzzard, Sparrowhawk, Marsh Harrier** and **Hen Harrier**. After a long day of walking we returned to the camping and decided to move eastwards next day.

Gorgan Bay

After some busses and taxis we arrived at a camping ground north of Bandar Torkaman (*map 9, point 18*). Extensive flats dominated this shallow bay, and birds were numerous. **Great** and **Little Egrets** were numerous, as were the waders. **Dunlin, Little Stint, Black-tailed Godwit** and **Common Snipe** were most numerous, with good numbers of **Common Ringed Plover**, some **Temmincks Stints** and **Marsh Sandpipers. Spotted Redshank** and **Ruff** completed the waders list. This all was topped with **Whiskered** and **White-winged Terns**, lots of **Meadow Pipits**, **Water Pipits** and **Skylarks.** Suddenly a loud call attracted our attention, a **Richard's Pipit**. Our goal here was Black-Headed Penduline Tit, but unfortunately we couldn't find any. Nightfall brought a calling **Pin-tailed Sandgrouse** and **Barn Owl** from the tent (*map 9, point 19*).

Next day we explored an extensive coastal plain with some reedbeds (*map 9, point 20*). Still no Penduline Tits. But birding was nice, waders were numerous, **White-tailed Eagle** on the shore, thousands of **Cormorants** in the air intermixed with some **Flamingo's**. **Meadow Pipits** were omnipresent and bearing in mind the putative Buff-bellied I was on edge. Again I heard some single calls which sounded different. Also **Red-throated Pipits** were fairly common. So I armed myself with my camera in video mode to record the calls, but first I was surprised by an **Eagle Owl** taking off, only some meters in front of me! I managed to record some calls and judging from the spectrogram, it was likely **Buff-bellied Pipit**!

We walked along a ditch with reeds and saw some Moustached Warblers and 3 Golden Jackals.

Then moving a bit more north, but weather turned bad so we decided to go to Gorgan, were we stayed in a motel.

Gorgan (24-25/11)

We spent a day in the "jungle" south of Gorgan to search for Caspian Tit. But were not successful. It was however a nice walk in a forest were autumn just started. Some forest birds were added to the list: Coal Tit, Hawfinch, Greater Spotted Woodpecker, Eurasian Nuthatch and Eurasian Treecreeper. Also some Masked Wagtails next to the road. In the afternoon I made a small tour in the rural outskirts and found a group of Woodlarks, White-tailed Eagle and a Hen Harrier. Next day we took the bus back to Tehran. In the Alborz mountains we had 2 Golden Eagles to end our trip.
