### Paphos 14-28<sup>th</sup> November 2018

Trip Report

#### **Introduction**

This was a late booked holiday with TUI staying at the excellent Pioneer Beach Hotel which cost around £850 each for flights, transfers and half board accommodation. Car hire was through Elephant Rent a Car and cost £194 for twelve days hire for a Fiesta. As the migration season was over we did not have high expectations of seeing too much but hoped to find some wintering birds and enjoy some nice walking in new locations. The weather during our stay was around 70-73 degrees f and the only rain we had was late afternoon on one day. In the evenings it was getting dark about four thirty pm so it does cut the birdwatching day down a bit. In reality we were pleasantly surprised by the number and quality of the birds seen and even kicked off a bit of a twitch on the island as detailed below.

### Paphos Headland Archeaological Site 15th November

After about thirty minutes walking around the site I took some pictures of a Meadow Pipit and a similar looking bird (at a distance) and thought no more about it, on reviewing the images back at the hotel I realised that the other bird was not a Pipit but a possible Rock Sparrow. About an hour later we were on the edge of the amphitheatre and in the middle of the field opposite was a Wheatear that looked different to any I had seen before. I took some distant shots and realised it could be something out of the ordinary so got closer, to about 25 yards and the bird was quite happy and continued feeding whilst I took some shots some of which are below. That evening I contacted the Cyprus Bird Recorder to let other birders Know and next day a number of birders were able to make contact with the bird and the discussion started as to what it might be. Initial thoughts were that it might be a femail Maghreb Wheatear, but then some of the experts thought a femail Finch's

Wheatear more likely, which is how it currently stands. Personally I am not so sure as normally Finch's are so shy you cannot get near them and this bird happily fed with me a relatively short distance away. Underneath the picture below is a Male Finch's Wheatear seen this year at Foinikas abandoned village for comparison.





This male Finch's Wheatear shows a typical pose of the species as it "dips" very low, when viewing the femail bird I did not observe this behaviour, Finch's this is the only Wheatear to do this.

Other birds seen here were; Tree Pipit, Sardinian Warbler, Crested Lark, Stonechat, Kestrel, Hooded Crow, Goldfinch, Black Redstart, Feral Pigeon, White Wagtail, House Sparrow, Greenfinch, Chaffinch, Collard Dove, Linnet. Also seen was this nice Swallowtail.


## Ezousas Valley 17<sup>th</sup> November

This was a new walk for us, starting at Episkopi and walking north for a few miles, lovely scenery along the way. Birds seen here were; Woodlark, Woodpigeon and a Purple Heron that appeared thirty feet from us as we sat by the stream and flew off at speed! Also seen was this rather impressive Hornet.

# Aspro Dam 18<sup>th</sup> November



As can be seen from the above picture this reservoir is very short of water, on our last visit the reservoir sides on the rh side in the picture above were full of water and fishermen were fishing from where the "tide line" is. In and around Paphos there is a massive boom in hotels being built and housebuilding and I do wonder where all the water required is going to come from!

Birds seen here were a very distant Bonelli's Eagle, Fan-tailed Warbler, Corn Bunting, Yellow-legged Gull, Blackcap, Great Tit and Spanish Sparrow. Whilst walking in a newly watered potato crop we flushed a Jack Snipe who unsurprisingly came down again in the crop close by.

# Passouri Reedbed Hide 19<sup>th</sup> November

Since our last visit a two storey hide has been completed with a couple of small ponds cut into the reeds providing good views over the whole reedbed, there is another hide further along the road but this had no water, only Cattle in view. Birds seen here were one Marsh Harrier, Moorhen, Water Rail and Kingfisher.

Birds seen on a walk around the headland were Little Egret, Whimbrel, two Greater Sand Plover, Ringed Plover, twenty Golden Plover, Common Sandpiper, Kingfisher and a dozen Linnets.

### Sanctuary of Apollo Ruins 21<sup>ST</sup> November

The only birds seen here were a Robin and Blue Rock Thrush, on our exit from the site we had to brake the car to avoid running over a five foot long Black Whip Snake in the road.

#### **Ladies Mile Hide**

This hide is a few hundred yards on the right before you get to the Ladies Mile Beach, it has two story's and the reeds had been cut just before our visit which helped in seeing a good selection of birds.

Birds seen in our one hour visit were; Moustached Warbler (lifer), Cetti's Warbler, Chiffchaff, Bluethroat, Water Pipit, Water Rail, Mallard, Shoveler, Gadwall, Coot, one Widgeon a Snipe and around a hundred Black-headed Gulls.

Visiting here we hoped to catch up with some Finch's Wheatear which I had heard occasionally winter here, after telling my wife these are fairly rare birds we actually saw six in and around the ruins along with a Blue Rock Thrush and around a hundred Jackdaws.

# Mandria 23<sup>rd</sup> November

Birds seen here were; Skylarks, Linnets and a Black Frankolin.



Only when viewing this picture did I realise how large the Black Frankolin's feet are!

The water levels on this dam were again very low and birds seen were Grey Heron, Great Egret, five Little Grebes, three Cormorants and a Ring-tailed Harrier that flew briefly over.

This site has been heavily trashed by the local hotels/builders and very little of the original scrub remains. On the rocks however a hovering Kingfisher fished daily and a Dunlin was there most evenings. About thirty Skylarks and Meadow Pipits roosted here in the evening.
