ANN AND ROLAND GO BIRDING IN COSTA RICA

DECEMBER 22ND 2024 – JANUARY 5TH 2025

TRAVEL

We flew from Bogota to San Jose having spent the previous week in Columbia.

Unfortunately, Roland still didn't have his suitcase as we never saw it again once he had handed it over to Air France in Manchester \cong

It was cool and windy and chucking it down when we left. No problem with the flight apart from a 20 minute delay.

This was a more basic flight with Avianca and although we had posh, comfortable seats we weren't so much as offered a drink of water on the plane. Everything had a price!

LOGISTICS

Once again, Pieter of Aratinga Tours had devised our itinerary and made all the arrangements.

Dec 26th: full day local guide to bird the trails; Pocosol biological station BLD

Dec 27th: drive to Tarcoles Birding Hotel, Carara area BLD

Dec 28th: private half day tour at Carara national park and private boattour on Tarcoles River, Tarcoles Birding Hotel BLD

Dec 29th: drive to Villa Tica (standard room) BLD

Estimated travel time: 3,5 hours

Dec 30th: full day birding tour in the area with visit to Aracari birding deck, Villa Tica BLD

Dec 31st: drive to Hotel Bougainvillea, standard room BLD

Estimated travel time: 3,5 – 4 hours

Jan 1st: Drive to Rincon de la Vieja overnight at Oski Lodge

Jan 2nd: -Bird area

Jan 3rd: -Bird area and drive to San Rafael Birding Lodge

Jan 4th: Bird Manuel Brenes Road then drive to Hotel Bougainvillea (standard mountain view room) D

Jan 5th: half day tour at Cope; at 5:00 pm dropoff rental car at rental car office at airport B

ACCOMMODATION

Bogota: Habitel. Excellent. We have stayed here several times now.

Heredia: Hotel Bougainvillea. Very good. We have stayed here several times already! Refused to do a packed breakfast though.

Tortuguero: Mawamba Lodge. A sprawling place which is well set out in what they call a botanical gareden. Situated on the river bank with easy access to the beach and a short walk away from the village. Rooms quite good and clean. Verandah outside with hammocks. The walls are flimsy though and being terraced you have to stay quiet so as not to disturb your neighbours. We are unlikely to go again but if we did, we would choose a better room with no adjoining ones. Good facilities, lovely staff.

Pocosol: Pocosol Biological Station. Not very welcoming. Reception and the restaurant are in the same building with a large verandah outside and good views. The rooms are all across the way on 3 floors. Our room wasn't massive but it did have lovely views and a small balcony. Basic but had all we needed apart from wifi. Not the most comfortable bed ② No choice of meal or time. If you're not there on time, tough.

Las Nubes: Villa Tica. We were given the wrong directions by Pieter but thanks to Roland's determination and my asking at a house we got there! We were apparently the first guests to have found it without having to go back to San Ignacio and wait for Orlando to meet them there. What a place! We had the whole of this lovely place to ourselves and were waited on hand and foot. The service, views and feeders are absolutely wonderful!!!!

Rincon de la Vieja: San Rafael Eco Lodge. They weren't expecting us. Nice enough place with good gardens. Our room was basic – the bathroom had the dreaded electric shower. Food was basic and horrible.

La Tigra: San Rafael Eco Lodge. The owner is very proud of his hotel especially his extension: a bedroom in the forest. We were housed here and it was a lovely annexe. Our room was small but adequate. Lovely sitting out area. The pool, restaurant and relaxation are all under the same roof. Echoey. Menu not best. Refused to do breakfast even when we suggested they could just do us some hard-boiled eggs in advance and put out some fruit. The "path" linking the annexe to the main buildings was muddy and flooded.

Heredia: Hotel Bougainvillea. The usual!

DIARY

Each day's entry has a list of the birds and non-bitds seen that day and full lists are at the end.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 23rd

Hotel had refused to do a packed breakfast but there was coffee available. We had to leave at 6h45. The bus took us to the Rio Dante Restaurant for breakfast then to the river. It rained all the way. It was pretty chaotic when we got off the bus as there were so many people milling around most of whom didn't seem to know what they were doing. Eventually we were told to go to our boat with our luggage then they sent us away again for 15 minutes.

Everywhere was VERY muddy. Once on the boat, it took an hour to get to our lodge. We had the same tour guide all the way - he never stopped talking, was very loud and didn't half spout some rubbish.

The lodge was very big and sprawling with beautiful gardens and even an alleged frog garden. Invisible, they were.

Our room was in a terrace and was fine but if anyone noisy was next door, you could hear everything.

There wasn't much choice at lunch (set menu) but it was tasty enough.

We walked into the village afterwards having finally located the path. There were no signs. The beach was on our left but was nothing like we had imagined. Inviting it wasn't and there was no sign of the tapirs we had been told would be there but at least it was fine. There was flooding in the village and it was basically a line of eating and drinking places and tourist shops with one supermarket. We bought some water and a sloth souvenir.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 24TH.

Coffee in reception and boat trip at 6. No new birds but we enjoyed it. Stayed fine. Water high because of all the rain. No kayaking or canoeing allowed. The highlight might have been the Neotropic otters I spotted in the river!

Our walk to the village after breakfast was brilliant. We finally got to see *Great green macaws*. They are absolutely stunning and we spent quite a while with them. Fascinating to watch and such colours. We also saw *Collared aricaris* etc and then the baby sloth again which had moved into a better position. We saw more macaws on our way back for lunch.

We didn't see many birds on our afternoon boat trip but we loved the iguanas, the howler monkey holding her baby and the spider monkey eating a flower. We were able to go into a few areas that wouldn't normally be accessible because they are too shallow then ventured into Harold Canal looking for caimans etc and had a very exciting time. Not. The current was horrendous because of the flooding (an extra metre of water) and we got stuck. Our guide started to panic a little and hurt his arm straining to get us out of the current. We did eventually manage to get back to the river and went down towards the ocean but not too close so as not to get swept out into the ferocious waves. We were heading straight into bad weather now but the two men soon got the roof on and we headed back home, thanking our guide, Alexis, profusely for two enjoyable trips.

We had intended to bird the gardens when we got back but it was too dark. There was a nice Green iguana in one of the trees near our room and I decided I wanted to and have a nice coffee and chill near the pool before dinner.

We had something of a disturbed night thanks to some understandably excited children and a presumably drunken woman with an excruciating laugh and loud friend a few rooms down.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 26TH.

Up bright and early to be across at the main building to meet our guide, Alberto, at 6h00. We had a bit of a walk down towards the lagoon because it was too early for breakfast at 7 on the dot. It was on this walk that we saw the *Olive-backed* quail dove.

Alberto was very good and had a scope with him which was great because ours was broken. Afterwards we had some good views of birds such as *Collared aricaris, Crimson-collared tanagers, Bright-rumped attila, Black-crested coquette* before setting off down the road for a walk. I wasn't feeling too good so returned after a while – knackered and dehydrated I think. I enjoyed my time on my own watching the birds around there and drinking copious amounts of water! When the men returned, they went for a walk down to the Lagoon but I stayed where I was. They saw some good birds but I enjoyed my bit of peace and quiet too.

After lunch, Alberto said he was leaving which was a bit of a surprise since he had been booked for the day but when we said we were going up a trail until it got impassable, he said he'd come with us. It got really bad after a while because they are working on improving the trails! He left after that and we went for a pleasant wander down the road where we saw *Black guan*.

We spent the rest of the daylight hours sitting on the verandah looking at monkeys, hummingbirds etc before enjoying another delicious meal $\stackrel{\textstyle \bowtie}{\cong}$

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 27TH.

We got up early so we could spend some time on the verandah before breakfast but it was disappointingly quiet.

We left immediately after breakfast. We had a slow drive to our next spot stopping off at a tourist spot for a drink, toilets and more tablets for Roland and had a wonderful surprise There was a banana feeder round the back of the buildings where a zip-line operated from. It was amazing and we were blown away by the number and variety of birds there. All those beautiful tanagers! And a lifer to boot: *Blue and gold tanager* I was delighted to be asked if I would like to hold a piece of banana – daft question. Of course I would and soon had tanagers eating from it and perching on my hand and fingers. Seventh heaven and the racoon pottering about lower down was a bit of a cute cutie too.

We arrived at Tarcoles Birding Lodge at lunchtime and there was no-one there. Nor was there a proper sign. We drove off to check we were in the right place and when we returned someone else had just arrived and turned out to be the owner. He seemed surprised to see us and even more surprised that we were expecting to be fed! His wife rustled something up whilst we were being entertained by the White-faced capucin monkeys they feed. Very cute but they no longer get the Scarlet macaws etc because of that. So far as birding went, this was a disappointing place to stay. I had wanted to change it to Cerro Lodge or somewhere similar

where you get to see lots of birds close up. I also remember the quaint outdoor showers there back in 2014! Could be rubbish now, of course. After lunch Roland went to bed which was the best place for him and I sat outside enjoying the sun, birds and flowers.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 28TH

We had arranged breakfast for 6h30 but it was late so we had to leave most of it to get to Carara NP on time. Our guide, Santiago, was already there and almost ready. He had a Swarovski scope with him which was great. He took us on a four hour walk, pointing out they had only recently re-opened the park as it had been closed for a month due to the floods. You could clearly see the devastation in some areas. Highlights of the morning included the Green and black poison dart frog, Rufous piha, Chestnut-backed antbird, Streak-chested antpitta, Red-capped manakin, Blue-throated sapphire, and the male Tennasaur. There were 3 females on the ground too, so well camouflaged that I nearly stood on one! Santiago was very aimiable and knowledgeable about the park and its residents. 4 lifers was excellent! 😊

There was so much traffic when we left! Completely backed up – never seen it like that before We went for lunch then went more-or-less straight back out to ensure we wouldn't be late for our excellent boat trip where we had a different guide who was very likeable and knowledgeable as was the excellent boatman. We didn't see anything new and dipped on the hummingbird this time but the weather wasn't best - it was heading for rain, visibility was worsening and it was nearly dark when we got back.

Horrid drive back to hotel in the dark and rain with so much traffic and rubbish headlights on our vehicle.

69 birds spotted today of which 57 were new for the trip and 4 were lifers!

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 30TH.

Awful night's sleep for both of us – too much talking and coffee.

Orlando was round at to make coffee at an unearthly hour and our guide Noel was expected to arrive soon after. His face when he walked round to the terrace was an absolute picture! It was agreed that after coffee and buns we would have a short walk then return for breakfast followed by more walking and a drive around. Getting Noel away from the terrace was not easy especially when he and Orlando realised that they had met years ago.

It was a beautiful morning – blue skies and sunshine with some atmospheric clouds over the valley and distant mountains.

Noel proved to be an excellent guide with a quirky sense of humour. Corny jokes but he made me laugh and he was a very considerate person as well as being a superb guide. I would love

They both knew Ohio - I already knew about Orlando's connections there and asked Noel why he had been there then there loud No ways! as they had both been based in Daytona then Roland piped up that he had worked there too. Amazing coincidence. So much talking and it soon went rather cool too.

Orlando insisted on doing Roland's washing and drying it for him – seeing he only had 2 shirts, one pair of shorts and one pair of undies it didn't take long.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 1ST 2025

And now for the grand finale – 3 days birding with Patrick O'Donnell. We had birded with him the first time we had visited CR back in 2014 and he had also helped us with our itinerary. Up at 4h10. Downstairs ready and waiting for him well before 5h30. Waited and waited but no Patrick. Messaged him and he'd gone to the wrong hotel Anyway, it was on the way to where we were going so we went and picked him up there. Bit of spotting in the near dark then we set off on our long drive (nearly 400 kms) stopping here and there to see what we could see in the fields, swamps and on the coast. Good crop of birds round Tabaris etc including both *Long* and *Short-billed dowitchers*, lots of *Osprey* near a fish farm, a beautiful but shy *Lesser ground cuckoo* and *Spot-bellied bobwhite!* It was great to be birding somewhere warm and dry for a change. Very pleasant indeed. We were starving by lunchtime and begged a stop in Canas where the restaurant Mimi was one of the few places open. They had a nice buffet and then came round with an unexpected dessert – a strange jelly thing. Tasty enough.

We didn't stop again until we arrived at Oski Lodge. Cool, misty, damp. Gates closed. No signs of life. Pat eventually managed to open the gates but there was no-one up by the lodge so we had to sit and wait whilst Pat made a few phone calls and a lady appeared. She was surprised to see us and seemed to be saying that we didn't have a booking. Oh yes we did! All paid for! We were eventually shown inside ad she opened 3 rooms for us to choose from. She also opened up the shutters so we could see everywhere better and it did look quite nice with gardens, sitting out areas etc. She would not make us dinner though but did agree to a pot of welcome coffee. Said we had to go down the road to a soda. It was ok. Not much choice but freshly made and edible.

We saw some *Pauraque* on the way back and as it had stopped raining, Pat wanted to walk in the grounds. It was grim underfoot and I would have hated it in daylight never mind in the dark! Then the rain came on again so we headed back inside only to find that we couldn't get into our room! The key that had been in the lock was the wrong one – we hadn't noticed. Just took it out and pulled the door to. Was there a spare key or a pass key? No. The lady went through every key she had and even tried to break in but nothing worked. We stopped for lunch at the Hotel Wilson in Upala. Patrick's choice. We would have preferred a soda. I tried one last time for a ceviche. It was just about acceptable – the toilets weren't Heaven only knows when they last cleaned the washbasins and surrounding area. No soap, no towels. Ugh 🙁

It had been warm and sunny when we arrived but now it was absolutely lashing it down again. It seemed an awful long way up to the Cabanas at San Isidro – another one. How many San Isidros are there in Costa Rica??

We were welcomed by our smarmy full-on host then directed to our room down the hill. We drove so we could park down there but had to walk up some horrid steps and along a part-flagged area all under water to get to the main building. No lights in the dark. Our room was small but ok — much glass and the block of rooms with a large terrace was surrounded by forest on 3 sides. Very nice There was limited storage space and they seem to be geared up to people only staying one or two nights.

The dining-room, pool and relaxation lounge were all under the same roof — open plan and echoing. There wasn't much choice for dinner. A packed breakfast was refused even though we only wanted some hard-boiled eggs and some fruit which could have been prepared there and then. There would be coffee he said but that was prepared later than he said.

Not quite sure how we managed to spot 62 species today given the conditions but we were with Pat, after all!

22 species seen with some really good spots but so frustrating for us all. We had been so looking forward to birding with Pat again but the conditions really were grim. We offered to drive him back home and said we would go up to Cinchona afterwards for food and the feeders. We wanted breakfast on the way though! So that's what we did. Pat suggested stopping at a restaurant we knew and hey presto – it was the place with the banana feeders: the San Luis Adventure Centre. He had all the details wrong – said it cost \$10 each and there were all sorts of conditions – he was either confusing it with somewhere else or it was an awful long time since he had been there. We took him round and were disappointed to see

that there were no bananas out though there were birds in the trees. All of a sudden about 50 tanagers (I kid you not) flew straight at us – they were landing on my hat and bouncing off me What on earth had frightened them? Nothing actually – there was a man standing behind us with his arms full of bananas and he was covered in tanagers. An amazing experience which even impressed Pat who was even more amazed when he spotted the *Blue and gold tanager*. As for the Northern racoon who wanted to make friends with me and maybe steal my camera ... and the White-faced coati.... And not only that, I was able to feed the birds again and asked Roland to do a short video. Loved it. A great stop – the cheese empanadas in the restaurant were delicious but they need to up the coffee cup size I was able, too, to nip into the souvenir shop to buy another cheap t-shirt or two We left with smiles on our faces and Pat just couldn't get over it all. Happy, happy

We passed a fantastic waterfall soon after – so pretty and very unusual with lots of small waterfalls combined but nowhere to stop

We duly dropped Pat off at his home then went up to Cinchona which was disappointing – a combination of factors: poor visibility, lack of birds, forgot part of our order, watered down juice, time of day.... Roland was very tired and the roads were busy ...
