This was a trip that had been long anticipated by us because it would yield several lifers for me and many more for Comghal. We would concentrate on the eastern warblers with additional targets in the woodpecker and owl species. In birding timing is everything and we knew that the owls and woodpeckers would be much harder in late May than in April. However we also wanted the summer visiting warblers, so we chose late May for a compromise. Unfortunately we fell between two stools, the owls and woodpeckers proved extremely difficult to find and the warblers were late this year due to the weather patterns. Finding rare / scarce birds is sometimes the triumph of hope over reality with the additional right place wrong time expression thrown in, this was the case for us.

#### Thursday 19th May : Dublin to Riga

We flew with Ryanair from Dublin to Riga approximately 3 hours some of it quite bumpy as we neared Latvia. We arrived at 22:00 and were met by our guide for the entire week <a href="Karlis Millers">Karlis Millers</a> of <a href="birdinglatvia.lv">birdinglatvia.lv</a>. We proceeded immediately to our hotel in the Kemeri National Park, the Valguma Pasuale, which is an excellent location to explore the park.

#### Friday 20th May: Kemeri National Park / weather showery rain until 15:00, then overcast

We initially intended to go for an early morning walk but due to the inclement weather we birded from our balcony before breakfast at 09:00. The apartment balcony overlooking the lake was one of the bonuses of this excellent hotel.

Birds of note seen from the balcony were , Common Crossbill Pied Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Willow Tit, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Gooseander, Goldeneye, Long-tailed Tit ssp. caudatus.

After an excellent but prolonged breakfast due to the rain we set out around 11;00 to drive to one of the many lakes in the region.

Our first stop was to be a tower overlooking a marsh , it had a roof so we could shelter from the rain which by this time was intermittent. Along the way we picked up several species;-

Marsh Harrier, Greylag Goose, Common Crane, Pochard, White Stork, Common Sandpiper, Common Snipe, Cuckoo, White Wagtail, Sedge Warbler, Willow Warbler, European Pied Flycatcher and Hawfinch.

At the tower itself we saw Icterine Warbler, Whinchat, Song Thrush, Mistle Thrush, Siskin, Serin, Hooded Crow, Eurasian Jay and Magpie. As the rain began to ease we walked back to the car and drove to a second tower hide. The road ran between two reed filled lakes and we were constantly scanning the edges for birds and very soon we came across <u>four Savi's Warblers</u> singing at the reed edge. We were able to get excellent views of this bird that is normally quite difficult to see. Also present were Reed Buntings, Common Sandpiper and several Yellow Wagtails sp thunbergii.

Arriving at the second tower hide the rain started again and luckily for us it was only a short walk to the reach shelter. The bird life at first was distant, Common Terns, Whiskered Terns, Little Gulls, Black-headed Gulls, Herring Gulls, Red-necked Grebes, and a very distant but very recognisable White-tailed Eagle.

Standing under the tower roof we could constantly hear the 'boom' of the Eurasian Bittern but not see it! However after 20 minutes not one but two birds flew past the tower, unbelievable to see them metres away. Other birds around the tower were, Black Terns, Marsh Harriers, Yellow Wagtails, Lesser Whitethroats, Common Whitethroats, Penduline Tits Common Starling, Blackcaps, Reed Buntings and Whinchats.

With the rain over we headed off on the long drive to the Ziemupe wilderness area and another of our target birds, Parrot Crossbill.

After searching for over an hour without success, we proceeded to our second night's accommodation the Manor House Hotel in Ziemupe.

#### Saturday 21st May: Ziemupe-Cape Kolka / weather overcast in the morning followed by rain showers .

Comghal and I got up at 06:00 and went for an early morning walk before breakfast. The grounds around the hotel were full of birds and we soon picked up several new birds for the trip, Thrush Nightingale, Common Rosefinch, Redpoll ssp flammea. Greenfinch, Grey Wagtail, Goldfinch and Chaffinch.

We left hotel at 10:00 and headed back to the Ziemupe wilderness area to resume our search for Parrot Crossbill but once more we failed to find them after a three hour search.

Early afternoon we drove north towards Cape Kolka, stopping at several points along the way picking up birds as we went such as Goshawk, Black Woodpecker, Black Grouse, Golden Oriole, Bullfinch, Great Grey Shrike, Red-backed Shrike, Hen Harrier and Green Sandpiper


The primary targets in the afternoon were Capercaille and Hazel Grouse but after a lengthy search of several forest tracks we failed to find them but we did manage to find Pygmy Dwl, one of our prime targets. An unusual find whilst driving up and down the forest tracks was a very confiding Woodcock sitting at the side of the road.

We arrived at the cape at 19:00 hours and went straight to guesthouse USI, our accommodation for the next two nights. We booked a brand new modern cabin just 200m from the cape. The cabin was first class! After dinner at a local café in the village we went for a good night's sleep.

#### Sunday 22nd May: Cape Kolka / weather sunny with wispy clouds at times

At last better weather was forecast for the next few days at least and as usual Comghal and I got up at O6:00 for an early walk before breakfast. Cape Kolka was only a few hundred metres from the cabin ,so we decided to go for a walk along the beach, to see what we could find. Sea conditions were good with a moderate NE wind , resulting in quite a few birds near shore , notably Common Scoter, Velvet Scoter, Goldeneye Long-tailed Duck, Goosander, Black-throated Diver, Mallard, Barnacle Goose, Sandwich Tern, Common Tern, Herring Gull, Great Black-backed Gull, Black-headed Gull, and Baltic Gull

Following the bracing walk along the beach we returned to Guesthouse USI for a wonderful breakfast. We would now be spending the next day and a half exploring the birdlife around the cape. Karlis did say it would depend on wind direction and speed, as to what was about.

We first explored the bushes in and around the cape and it certainly was as good as was hoped for, Yellow Wagtails ssp thunbergii/ flavissima. Were by far the most abundant migrant, 100+ birds on the guesthouse lawn.

Also noted around village were Red-breasted Flycatchers, Tree Pipits, Garden Warblers, Hawfinches, Bullfinches, Common Rosefinch, White Wagtails, Meadow Pipits, Skylarks, Fieldfares, Northern Wheatear, Common Redstarts, Black Redstarts and Spotted Flycatchers everywhere

Back at the guesthouse Karlis had found a Bluethtroat ssp sveccia in the vegetable garden. The bird, sitting in a bush a few metres from where the gardener was working. As the day got warmer in the sunshine we spent the afternoon in the garden watching the sky for migrating birds. Prominent among the migrants were Common Buzzards, Common Cranes, Black-throated Divers, Greater Scaup, Redwings, Fieldfares.

Single birds noted were Red-footed Falcon, Lesser Spotted Eagle, Hobby White-tailed Eagle, Marsh Harrier, Goshawk, and at least seven or more Sparrowhawks. At 18:00 we called it a day and walked back to the USI Guesthouse and then to the village for dinner. On the way back from dinner Comghal said I wouldn't be surprised if we 'jammed' a Nightjar and indeed that was the case. A fitting end to a wonderful day's birding.

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#### Monday 23rd May: Cape Kolka - Mersraga - Kemeri NP / weather sunny with light SE winds

Monday 06:00-12:00 we spent biding around the cape apart from our leisurely breakfast at the questhouse.

It appeared a lot of the birds that were here yesterday had taken note of the favourable wind change overnight and left. There certainly was quite a fewer number of birds around but birds that we did see were still of interest notably, several Chiffchaff ssp abietinus had arrived along with a a mixed flock of Hawfinches, Bullfinches, Chaffinches and Siskins. Single birds seen were Osprey and Honey Buzzard

There was also a noticeable increase in Red-backed Shrikes and Garden Warblers, Common Buzzards, Northern Wheatear, Tree Pipits and out at sea Long-tailed Ducks and one Osprey

After a light lunch we headed east again along the Gulf of Riga towards Mersraga coastal marsh in search of new birds for the trip. Two hours later we arrived at the marsh stopping several times along the way to scan the coast for migrating birds.

The marsh consists of a long reed bed behind a sandy bar and our main target here was Citrine Wagtail which we eventually found after a 30 minute search.

Additions to our list here were Temminck's Stint, Greenshank, Dunlin, Sanderling, Ruff, Black-tailed Godwit, Bar-tailed Godwit and Whimbrel. Also present was a single Vevet Scoter about 200 metres offshore, giving excellent views.

After an hour the birding began to slow up with nothing new found so we decided to go for dinner in the nearby town . This was after we learnt our hotel's restaurant does not open on Monday evenings. Arrived back at Valguma Pasuale Hotel in the Kemeri National Park and went to bed.

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#### Tuesday 24th May: Kemeri NP- Lubans Wetlands / weather mostly sunny with some cloud in the evening

Comghal , Karlis and I met up at 07:00 and went for a walk around the hotel environs and they are quite stunning with a river and lake adjacent to the hotel. Within minutes of leaving hotel we saw Long-tailed Tit ssp.caudatus in the trees at the hotel carpark. We then went along the riverside walk and observed Grey-headed Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Icterine Warbler, Goosander, Raven, Jackdaw, Siskin, and finally as we approached the hotel entrance we spotted a Black Woodpecker and the fenno-scandia race of Nuthatch ssp europaes having a whitish breast instead of the rust buff tones of western european birds.

After breakfast we set out on the long drive, 250 Km to the Lubans Wetland area in eastern Latvia near the Russian border. Along the way we made a couple of stops , the first yielding our only Marsh Warblers of the trip, a pair at a riverside stop near Riga. The final stop was for lunch at a roadside café and this rewarded us with good views of two Red Kites hunting along the edge of the motorway.

As we approached our destination around 19:00 hours , for a two night stay, the Stikani Guesthouse we noted two more birds for the trip, five Stock Doves in a ploughed field and a covey of Grey Partridge near the roadside

The Guesthouse was in a superb setting beside a lake and you could bird virtually from your window the surrounding gardens, Golden Oriole Thrush Nightingale, Yellowhammers, Willow Tit, Goldfinch, Bittern, Black Terns could all be heard as we un-packed our luggage.

After a quick cup of coffee Karlis and Comghal left at 21:00 for a one hour drive to see if they could find a Great Snipe lek, which they did after a 20 minute search .

I on the other hand went for a evening walk along the lakeside road to a chorus of Bittern, Thrush Nightingales, Black Terns and White-winged Black Terns

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#### Wednesday 25th May: Nagli Ponds-Lubans Wetlands / weather mostly sunny with some slight showers later on

Penultimate day of the trip and as usual Comghal and I went for an early morning walk, joined by Karlis later at 07:00.

As we were watching a Red-Necked Grebe in the early morning light, Comghal noticed a smaller grebe amongst the Great-Crested Grebes and in fact it turned out to be our only Slavonian Grebe of the trip. He also found a pair of Garganey for good measure. Above our heads were a number of Black Terns and White-winged Black Terns.

As usual after a sumptuous breakfast put on by our host, we headed out to visit the nagli Ponds - Lubans Wetlands complex. It wasn't long before we were thrilled to observe three Montagu's Harriers in display mode, two males and a female. We watched the trio for over ten minutes before moving on along the track.

We continued to search the ponds for our target bird which had been reported there the previous day, namely Marsh Sandpiper and after an hour long search Karlis eventually found it along with several other waders.

As we continued along the pond tracks we came across <u>seven</u> White-tailed Eagles circling in the sky. Also present were several Common Buzzards and two Lesser Spotted Eagles. It was Karlis's opinion that there was likely a carcass in the area to draw in so many eagles.

We then spent the afternoon looking for target species that we had missed but apart from a Wryneck, we failed to connect with any.

After a field lunch we headed back to the Lubans Wetlands to look for two more of our target species . We heard one , River Warbler but after a half an hour we decided to give up when Karlis heard our second target bird and within a few minutes he had found it showing low down in a bush. It was Blyth's Reed Warbler, a great find to end the day. We were delighted that at last we had found another eastern warbler to add to the Marsh Warbler we saw the previous day.

#### Thursday 26th May: Nagli Ponds-Lubans Wetlands / heavy rain early morning followed by drizzle and then showery.

Our last day and Karlis pulled all the stops out to try and find those elusive warblers, Booted and Greenish. This year they were late in and timing is everything in birding, it just wasn't to be. We also visited several sites for our missing woodpeckers but once again no luck but we did find a Middle Spotted Woodpecker near Riga.

Comghal and I would like to thank <u>Karlis for his phenomenal birding skills</u> in finding the birds for us. We would like to thank our hosts , Valguma Pasaule Hotel in Kemeri NP, Manor House Hotel in Ziemupe, USI Guesthouse in Cape Kolka and finally the Stikani Guesthouse in the Lubans Wetlands Reserve. All were exceptionally friendly and helpful. The food first class!
